From the Principal

Happy St Joseph's Day! Joseph was the husband of Mary and foster-father of Jesus. He protected and cared for them, placing their needs before his own. St Joseph is an example to us of how an ordinary person can have an extraordinary love for others. Through Joseph's example, we can learn to trust in God's way.

Our College is proud to be a place of generosity and kindness. In our community, we have many people who offer their time, skill and knowledge as a way of helping our school become the best it can be. Yesterday, at our St Joseph Feast Day Mass and Leadership Induction, we recognised Ros Barnes, the recipient of the Minister for Education and Child Development Volunteering Award for Outstanding Service. Ros has been a Canteen volunteer for a significant number of years. Over the years, Ros has been very committed to helping in the canteen, she is good hearted and has always been willing to put her hand up.

This time last year the World Health Organisation (WHO) declared COVID-19 a global pandemic and the world as we knew it changed slowly then suddenly. In the final week of Term 1, I wrote the following:

"We are indeed living in interesting times. I have been involved in education for nearly 40 years and I have never known anything like the situation we are experiencing now. I can remember school shutdowns in Scotland due to extreme weather conditions, long-term transport strikes that stopped people from getting to work and school, extended flu seasons, but this is unprecedented. A global pandemic has hit our shores and affected the economic and social fabric of our society. We all know of people who have been impacted; lost jobs, cancelled weddings, funerals held with only a few family members, and now we face the absence of Easter services.

I am optimistic that we will get through this, as long as we do our bit. Stay at home – only going out for a daily walk, to buy essential items

and for medical care.”

Fortunately in Australia and, in particular, South Australia, we have done an amazing job of keeping us all safe. We are in a very fortunate position compared to the rest of the world; however, we still have a long way to go. I myself have not been on a plane since February 2020. I am very nervous about border closures and I do not relish the idea of having to do hotel quarantine.

School though is very much back to normal and hand sanitiser, QR codes and social distancing have become part of our daily lives. We have been able to complete all of our camps and events such as Swimming and Athletics Carnival. This weekend we will hold the Sister's Jubilee where we honour those Sisters of St Joseph who have given their life in the service of others.

Recent events have highlighted the importance of discussing with your daughter respectful relationships. Our Pastoral Care program aims to teach students what a respectful relationship looks like and should feel like. We do this at an age appropriate level. Some of our students will have part-time employment and they have a right to feel safe in the workplace and be able to report behaviour that makes them feel uncomfortable. It is a good idea to check in with your daughter that all is ok in their workplace and that they feel supported. Our College Counsellors and Pastoral Care Coordinators are available to discuss any concerns that you may have regarding the matters raised here.

We all have the right to feel safe, however, recent events have highlighted that many women do not feel safe in their own home, in the work place or walking down the street. This needs to change.

International Women's Day

The theme for this year's International Women's Day was 'choose to challenge'. There are many women who have made immense change in our world and this year the large number of women receiving the Order of Australia award is testimony to immense determination. Australia has seen many female pioneers and innovators. Our own home-grown saint, St Mary of the Cross MacKillop, was a woman of vision, courage and advocacy for those in need. Her vision for the education of young rural and struggling Australians has been the cornerstone of the values that underpin Catholic education in our nation today. She was a woman who challenged the status quo of her time and this, at times, brought her into disagreement with some Church authorities. Her values were firmly based in compassion, service and justice. Mary was a woman who acted with great integrity.

These values are the foundation of respectful relationships. When asked at enrolment interviews what parents want for their daughter as she graduates from Mary MacKillop, the answers are invariably: independent, self-assured with opportunities, assertive, caring and ready to take her place in the world. As we look at the media coverage on the topic of 'consent', it seems that respect is not always the foundation of relationships. Our Pastoral Care classes reinforce positive relationships, assertiveness, being confident in who you are, and are designed to instil in the girls' belief in their own capacity and immense self-worth.

Assessment Reminders

It is important for all to remember the process that must occur in matters relating to assessment. There is the perception for some that because the illness or misadventure is unexpected, this places them outside the normal processes and an (unwritten) set of rules can be applied. Sadly, this understanding can have disastrous effects on a student's results.

When a student is unwell, there is a set of actions that must be undertaken for the school to be able to support the student:

- **Contact the College:** Call the school before 9.00am to alert the school of the absence and have a conversation with the subject teacher about next steps if you are unsure. Also contact your daughter's subject teacher via Direct Messaging on SEQTA.
- **Provide a medical certificate:** For students in Years 10, 11 and 12, a medical certificate must be provided outlining the specific nature of the condition and the symptoms, and clearly outlines when the student will be back at school. This must be emailed to the subject teacher and Pastoral Care teacher so that alternatives can be arranged. (This applies to students who are away even for just one day.)

In the case of assignments, illness on the day is not a valid reason to delay the submission of the assignment because they may have already had weeks to work on this. The assignment should always be saved in the student's OneDrive and this would need to be submitted via SEQTA or Turnitin so that it can be checked for our academic integrity compliance.

Lent and Project Compassion

On Tuesday 16 February (Week 4), the College celebrated Shrove Tuesday by selling pancakes at recess. Shrove Tuesday is a time in the Liturgical calendar which signals the end of the Epiphany and the beginning of Lent, a time of penance and renewal. Following this the College gathered in the gymnasium to celebrate Ash Wednesday by holding a Liturgy. This began our journey to Easter. Ashes were placed on our forehead as a sign of our desire to repent and turn back to God. As the Lenten season begins with Ash Wednesday, it also marks the beginning of the annual Caritas Australia Project Compassion Appeal. Donations to Project Compassion allow Caritas Australia, the Catholic Agency for International Aid and Development, to work with local communities around the world to alleviate poverty, hunger, oppression and injustice. At the College, we encourage students to put their compassion into action through prayer, fasting and almsgiving. Each pastoral care class has received a Project Compassion box and students may donate in this way and/or organise a fundraiser within their class or cohort. The theme for this year is “Be more”. This was inspired by St Oscar Romero, when he used the words “Aspire not to have more, but to be more.” In the gallery below, you will find some stories of Project Compassion that the Year 8 students have been learning.

JJAMM @ Penola

The Student Leadership Teams of Mary MacKillop College, Kensington and Mt Carmel College, Rosewater attended JJAMM @ Penola from 8 to 10 February. This special event was offered to our leaders to learn more about the Josephite tradition, to build strong relationships and a vision to develop a shared culture within each College. This experience helped the student leaders to:

- Identify with the broader Josephite community and the core values of the Josephite tradition
- Explore the nature of leadership in a Josephite context and to experience where it all began
- Assist young people in coming to recognise Mary MacKillop as a role model for living the Gospel
- Develop their responsibility to represent the legacy of Mary MacKillop and the Sisters of St Joseph.

Music is a fantastic way to supplement learning and personal development. Students involved in bands, choirs and instrumental lessons

are continuously provided opportunities to work together, develop friendships and bond through similar interests. They can learn courage, confidence, humility and enthusiasm.

We know that it is difficult to justify students starting lessons on a new instrument due to the cost of instrument hire on top of lessons. Therefore, we would like to offer the opportunity for students to try out instruments such as flute, saxophone, trumpet, oboe and clarinet.

Students and families who enrol to undertake lessons for the duration of 2021, will be provided an instrument free of cost. Families will however be liable for the end of year service and any damage sustained during the year.

It is important for students to show determination, dedication and perseverance when learning a new instrument and while learning something new for the first time may not come naturally, it is amazing what we can learn and achieve in six to nine months. Students may enrol at any time during the year.

The instruments we can offer are:

- x1 Tenor Saxophone
- x1 Alto Saxophone
- x1 Baritone Saxophone
- x3 Clarinets
- x5 Flutes
- x1 Violin

Instruments are limited to those above and will be allocated on a first come, first served basis.

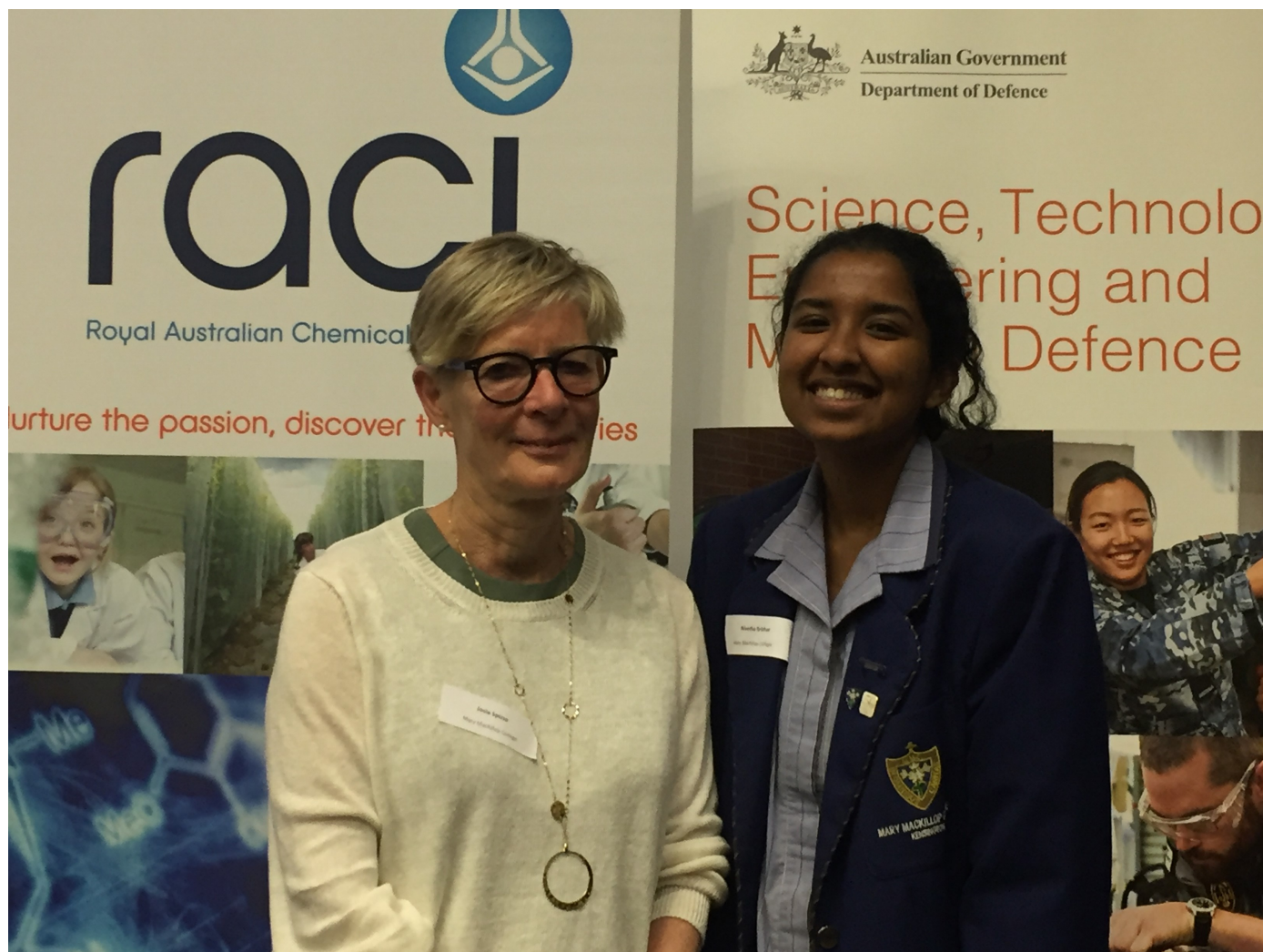

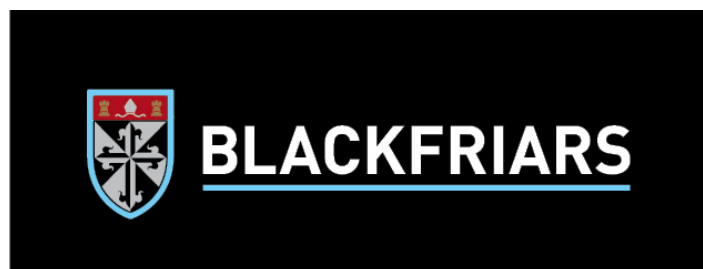
