

From the Principal

This week is Reconciliation Week and I have been delighted to see us all involved in a range of activities to acknowledge the struggles that our Indigenous brothers and sisters have gone through since the time the British landed in Australia, and to pray and hope for a better future.

Staff and students were involved in a public artwork, which is displayed on the fence facing High Street. This year's theme, "Be Brave, Make Change" is highlighted through a rainbow serpent made up of different coloured foam hands. The linking hands show our support of Australia's First Nations people and the diversity of our community. Our display was also in celebration of the Indigenous Netball Round held nationally and on our courts on Saturday 4 June.

I came to Australia in 1985 and did not know much about Aboriginal and Torres Strait Island Culture at that time.

I had seen documentaries in the UK by the Australian journalist, John Pilger, who talked about many of the terrible things that Aboriginal people had gone through.

Once in Australia, I read widely and watched movies to find out what I could about Indigenous culture and history. It also helped that I travelled quite a bit around the country and learnt more through visiting different parts of Australia and the Torres Strait Islands.

I was surprised to find out that it was only in 1962 that the Electoral Act was amended so that Aboriginal people could vote but it was not compulsory, and that Aboriginal people were not counted on the Census until 1971.

Through films like 'The Rabbit Proof Fence, The Sapphires, Samson and Delilah, Walkabout and In my blood, it runs', we can understand some of the history, trauma and struggles of Aboriginal people in Australia. I encourage you to watch some of these movies (Please note the rating guidance on some of these films.)

Evonne Goolagong, Cathy Freeman, Adam Goodes and of course Ash Barty are all excellent athletes and role models for all Australians and in particular Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people. We learn through the stories of these sports people and how they now pay it forward through foundations and activism, striving to improve the lives of Indigenous people. Aboriginal people have worked hard to bring attention to the many inequalities that still exist. Low levels of literacy and poor health outcomes are two areas where a lot of work needs to be done.

You might not be aware that an old scholar of ours, Jada Alberts is an Australian actor, playwright and director. You might have seen them in the ABC drama series Mystery Road and Cleverman.

I thank everyone who has worked hard to make Reconciliation Week a success and hope that we can build on this year by year. You never know one day we might be able to get Jada Alberts to come to an Assembly!

#### Year 10 Retreat: In the footsteps of Mary MacKillop... social justice in the city

On Friday 3 June two Year 10 classes (10B and 10G) were given the opportunity to embrace one of Mary MacKillop's qualities of a Woman of Justice by visiting various Catholic organisations who help the homeless. These were Vinnies Men's Night Shelter and Women's Crisis Centre, as well as Centacare. The day began by visiting St Francis Xavier Cathedral where the students prayed for all the people who are experiencing homelessness. This was followed by visiting the various homeless centres. Afterwards they engaged in discussions and activities at Cathedral Hall and in true Mary MacKillop spirit they put faith into action by creating bags of love for those who are experiencing homelessness. Below are some comments by the Year 10 students on their experience.

"I think the highlight was seeing the shelter, and how it's a good place for people who are experiencing homelessness. The people at the shelter want to give back to the community, by helping those experiencing homelessness." - Olivia

#### Year 7 Science: Bubble Mixture Investigation

In Year 7 Science we have started learning about Mixtures. As an introduction to this topic we conducted an investigation where we changed the components of a bubble mixture to see the effects it would have on the mixtures' properties (e.g. longer lasting bubbles, bigger bubbles, etc).

We made three different types of bubble mixture. The first two mixtures consisted of the same ingredients (baby shampoo & water), however, different amounts of each ingredient. The third mixture had the same ingredients as the first two, but with glycerine and gelatine added.

We got to experiment with different types of bubbles, and we made our own bubble blowers out of wire, pipe cleaners, and straws. The three types of bubble mixtures we made were, thick and bouncy. Some of us found that the bouncy and thick ones were the best because they made the biggest bubble, and we could hold them if our hands had lots of the mixtures on them.

In the end, every group put all their mixtures in a large tray, and we made a huge bubble blower. We tried to make a very big bubble, but it wasn't strong enough most of the time, so we only made one big one. We made a mess, but we enjoyed it and had lots of fun. We learnt lots about mixtures and cannot wait to do more interesting mixture experiments.

#### Magill Sunrise Rotary Club Breakfast

On Tuesday 17 May, students who attended the Santos Science Experience in December 2021, were invited to address Magill Sunrise Rotary club members at their May breakfast meeting.

Simon Brewer (President) has forwarded a copy of the Magill Sunrise Rotary Club bulletin and I would like to share what he wrote about the students' presentation with the school community.

"It was a superb experience to welcome the students we supported on the Science Experience to find out how it all went. And just wow! It was extremely clear that this experience opened eyes and minds and was potentially life changing for all involved.

Our students were from Years 10 & 11 and all were considering various STEM-related courses, so going to see how that works at University was very valuable.

In a social sense we heard how some had connected with others on the program who had come from regional areas like Mount Gambier, so they got a sense of the challenges involved in attending University from that origin.

There were also some very practical aspects about the different campuses that took some getting used to, such as the distances involved in getting to some campuses and the scale of them.

Although they all had an interest in STEM-related courses, they found out that there was quite a bit more to it than they thought, and they will have to keep an open mind to the courses they do. As an example, one remarked that they had not really considered Biology as a Year 11/12 subject because they didn't see how it related to their Uni pathway, but after visiting they now understand better and will likely consider that pathway. Others remarked how they had never considered mixed degrees, such as Politics + Science, but they could now see the benefits in considering those approaches.

A great aspect they also talked about was the group discussions, where they had and the chance to hear lecturers and how they work at Uni. They had pop quizzes at the end of each day to elicit more thought about what they had seen.

Overall, the great thing I picked up was that this had made these extremely intelligent and capable young women excited for their futures and keen to study hard to get the grades they need to move forward. It's wonderful to see the leaders of the future shaping up at this young age ready to face to world and make a difference.

From our perspective this could not have been more in line with the Rotary International theme for this year – Serve to Change Lives. By making this happen for these students it's very clear we're fulfilling that brief!"

The Santos Science Experience is a nationwide STEM outreach programme which aims to provide Year 9 and 10 students with an opportunity to explore a range of STEM related careers and University courses. As a result of this experience, another group of MacKillop students can now more confidently make informed decisions about future subject choices and courses of study involving STEM or aspects of STEM upon leaving MacKillop. Old Scholar News - Jessica Dempsey



As a student of Mary MacKillop College from 1991 to 1995, Jessica embraced College life and every opportunity that presented itself with zeal. Accompanying her success in academic pursuits, Jessica was also a talented singer, musician, actor, public speaker and writer. As well as receiving numerous awards for her academic pursuits and extracurricular activities during her first four years at the College, in her final year of secondary school Jessica was recognised for her many gifts. She was the recipient of:

- the inaugural Max Harris Award for Writing
- the Mary MacKillop Medal for All-Round Excellence
- the English Literature Prize
- the Girardi Family Drama Award
- the Mary MacKillop Prize for High Achievement in Science and participation in National Science Summer School
- the award for Citizenship and Service to the School Community
- an Outstanding Service to Music Award.

With interests in both the Arts and Science, her future path unfolded when Physics Teacher, Gavin Haydn and Science Leader of Learning, Josie Spizzo encouraged her to attend the National Youth Science Forum in Canberra in Year 11. Her positive experience at the forum and her interactions with the scientists there, especially Dr Rod Jory, whom she had the most profound respect and admiration for, influenced her decision to pursue post-secondary studies in Physics at the University of Adelaide.

In the 1995 Mary MacKillop College Yearbook Jessica wrote,

"In hindsight, I believe that the CRA National Science Summer School has affected me in ways which are difficult to describe, but with the motivation and inspiration that I now hold, I am hopeful that it will reflect in not only my Year 12 results but in my success in years to come."

And succeed she has. In the years since, Jessica has had an illustrious career from being the first Australian female scientist to work at the geographic South Pole for her PhD studies, to working as Deputy Director of the East Asian Observatory in Hawaii.

In December 2021, Jessica was appointed the very prestigious position of Director of ASTRON, the Netherlands Institute for Radio Astronomy. See full media release here.

As a world-renowned astrophysicist, Jessica was a member of The Event Horizon Telescope Collaboration, that was awarded the Breakthrough Prize in Fundamental Physics for capturing an image of a black hole for the first time.

As a College community we congratulate Jessica not only for her own stellar achievements but for her continued "commitment to creating greater diversity, equity and opportunity at all levels of astronomy and to enhancing opportunities for girls to become future leaders in science and technology careers".

Embodying the spirit, tenacity, and strength of character of St Mary of the Cross MacKillop, Jessica is the epitome of what Mary would have called the courageous soul, pursuing a dream and a unique career. Her time at Mary MacKillop College encouraged her to "lose not one opportunity of merit that presents itself to you".

# Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability 2022

It is a government requirement for all schools to participate annually in the Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD).

The NCCD collects data about school students with disability who are receiving adjustments across Australia in a consistent, reliable and systematic way. It enables schools, education authorities and governments to better understand the needs of students with disability and how they can be best supported at school (www.nccd.edu.au).

Information gathered is used:

- as an evidence base, to give teachers, schools and sectors information about students with disability and the level of educational adjustment being provided
- to inform policy development and future planning to better equip schools and education authorities to support students with disability

- to improve understanding of the requirements and responsibilities of school teams and the broader community under the DDA and the Standards
- to capture the work of schools under the obligations of the DDA and the Standards, allowing students with disability to access and participate in education on the same basis as other students
- to highlight the individual needs of each student with disability by focusing on the level of educational support provided to them at school (www.nccd.edu.au).

Information provided about students to the Australian Government for the NCCD includes:

- year of schooling
- category of disability: physical, cognitive, sensory or social/emotional
- level of adjustment provided: support provided within quality differentiated teaching practice, supplementary, substantial or extensive

Students' personal details are de-identified as a part of the data collection. Please contact Inclusive Education Coordinator, Leanne Carr if you have any questions about the NCCD.
